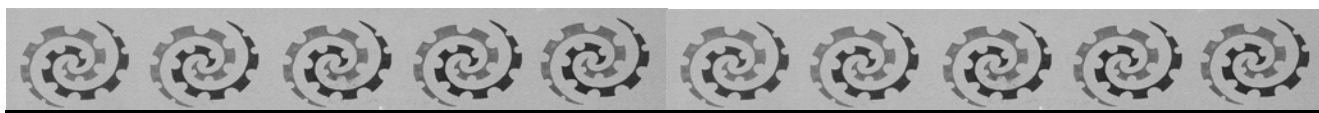



RUGBY LEAGUE WORLD CUP COMES TO ARANUI HIGH SCHOOL!

This year marks a significant step forward for Rugby League in New Zealand as the Rugby League World Cup Trophy remains safeguarded on our shores for another 4 years. On *March 5th* members of the Aranui High School Community will get the chance to view the trophy and have photos taken with the historical piece of silverware. The Rugby League World cup will be at Aranui High School from *11am - 11:45am* in the *big gym* on this day so get along and experience a taste of Rugby League History! This year we will be providing the opportunity for Aranui High School students to play Rugby League in the Canterbury Secondary Schools Competitions which will be run on Wednesdays in Terms 2 and 3. Students at both junior and senior levels will get the chance to pit themselves against the best players from other schools around Christchurch.

ARANUI HIGH SCHOOL RUGBY LEAGUE ACADEMY

It is also been an exciting start to the year for our newly introduced Aranui High School Rugby League Academy students of 2009 who have been training hard in the weights room, on the school field and around the community. There is a great mix of students in the academy this year which also features Canterbury representatives in Rugby League, Rugby Union, Touch Rugby and Ice Hockey. The Rugby League Academy features a large practical component in which students get the opportunity to learn about and experience various aspects of fitness training, skill learning and game knowledge specific to Rugby League. The Rugby league Academy welcomes all students from Year 12 and above who are keen to commit fully to the 12hr per week course designed to assist students in gaining the skills to pursue a career in Rugby League or Sports and Fitness related studies at tertiary level. NCEA

(NATIONAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT) FOR YEAR 11, 12 AND 13

If you are a parent of a student in Year 11, 12 or 13, they will be studying to achieve their National Certificate at Level 1, 2 or 3 in 2009. They will need to attend all classes and complete all assignments in order to achieve.

Students will need 80 credits to achieve the certificate. They gain the credits by passing unit standards or achievement standards. It is important to ensure your child attends school so that they are in class to complete assessments.

It is important that students have time to complete homework. Homework is often part of an assessment task. Many students have part-time work after school and at the weekends. It is important to remember that school is the main focus. Please make sure that there is time in your child's week to complete homework as well as meet work commitments. Employers are often willing to drop hours or swap shifts to allow students time to complete school work.

Students must pay a \$75 fee to NZQA (more for international students) so that they will manage the NCEA information. There is financial assistance available for students from homes where income is low. If there is a Community Services Card in the house, you may be eligible. You will need to apply for Financial Assistance before September. Forms are available at the school office and we can assist with processing these forms for you.

If you have questions about NCEA, please contact the Dean at school. Here are some of the answers to the frequently asked questions we receive.

1. How many credits does my son/daughter need to get?

NCEA Level 1

A student needs a minimum of 80 credits.

60 credits must be at level 1. 20 credits can be at Level 1,2 or 3

They must include 8 credits in Numeracy (Maths) and 8 credits in literacy (English or Te Reo Maori)

NCEA Level 2

A student requires a minimum of 60 credits at level 2 or above and 20 credits at any other level. Credits can be used for more than one qualification, so some of a student's NCEA Level 1 credits can count towards NCEA Level 2. At this level there are no specific literacy or numeracy requirements (although University Entrance has certain requirements – see Question 5 and 6 below).

NCEA Level 3

A student requires 80 credits – 60 credits must be at Level 3 or above and 20 must be at level 2 or above.

2. If a student doesn't gain NCEA Level One, can they go on to do NCEA Level Two?

Yes, although see Q 5. So long as they have gained the 8 Maths credits at Level One and the 8 English/Te Reo credits at Level One. Some students study a mixture of Level One and Two subjects in Year 12.

3. Are there any subjects that are compulsory for NCEA?

Yes. All students must take Maths and English at Level One. Students must gain 8 credits in English/Te Reo and 8 credits in Maths in order to gain the qualification.

4. How many credits do most students get?

Students have to gain a minimum number of credits at each Level (see Question 1). Most students gain between 70 and 100 credits. A small number of students go on to gain between 100 and 120 credits at the Level they are studying.

5. Can my son/daughter study any subject they like at Level Two and Three?

No. All students at Level 2 will complete an English or Te Reo course. Level 2 English standards are required for **University Entrance**.

A student must gain a minimum number of credits in certain subjects before they can go on and study that subject at a higher level. For example, if a student wants to study Chemistry at Level Two, they have to have passed some of the Level One Chemistry achievement standards. If a student wishes to study Maths at Level Two, they have to have passed some key Level One achievement standards first.

6. What does my son/daughter have to study and pass in order to get University Entrance?

To achieve the university entrance award, candidates must have a minimum of 42 credits at level 3 or higher on the National Qualifications Framework.

This must include a minimum of **14 credits at level 3 or higher** in each of **two areas of study** from an '**approved subject**' list, with a **further 14 credits at level 3 or higher** taken from **no more than two additional domains** on the National Qualifications Framework or approved subjects.

Candidates must also satisfy the requirement of achieving **eight credits in literacy at level 2 or higher - four in reading and four in writing - and 14 credits in mathematics at level one or higher.**

Staff at Aranui High School will assist your son/daughter at the start of Year 13 in making sure they are studying the right subjects in order to apply for University Entrance.

7. What are the fees for NCEA?

The fees in 2009 are \$75 per student. However, if you are eligible for financial assistance (beneficiary or income based) the fee drops to \$20 per student. It is important that you collect a 'financial assistance' form from our student information desk to apply for this assistance. All fees must be paid by due date (usually August). Late fees incur a penalty of \$50 and financial assistance is no longer applicable... ie: if you are late paying your fees, even though you are eligible for financial assistance, you will have to pay \$125.

8. Do I have to pay the fees?

Yes.

If you don't pay the fees your son/daughter is not eligible for any credits and will not be sent a Record of Learning by NZQA.

9. How can I keep up with the total number of credits my son/daughter is getting throughout the year?

Each student is sent an updated record of their credits with their school report at least twice a year. Students are also given a tracking sheet that they fill in as they gain credits in each class. You can also ring your son/daughter's Dean at any time and ask for an updated record of their credits.

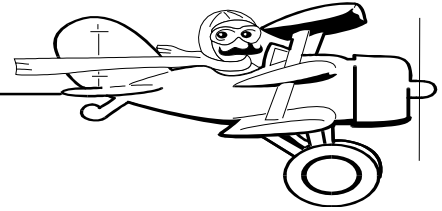
Sarah Terris has been selected to the National Federation 6 Under 15 **Football** team. This is an awesome achievement.

ACTIVITIES DAY REPORT

One of the highlights of our Peer Support Programme is Activities Day, when the Year 9 Form Classes and their Year 13 Leaders take part in a series of challenges and competitions. This year's event happened on February 19th. After some time in their Form rooms creating artistic and colourful Form banners, the groups went out to the Back field and participated in 8 different activities designed to develop co-operation within the group and competition against all other groups. After lunch it was back to the hall for the final activity-building the highest and most interesting tower using dried spaghetti and 28 jumbo marshmallows. This year was notable for the high standard of artistry in the banners and for the enthusiasm displayed by many of the groups.

The weather gradually improved during the day, which was rounded off with the 6pm BBQ for families of Year 9s and all new students.

Rock On Initiative

Close watch on truants

Truancy numbers are down in areas where agencies take a coordinated response through the Rock On initiative.

There's a firm knock on the-front door. You open it. A police officer stands before you, a letter in hand and explains how your child is a frequent truant, that you are responsible and that a number of agencies are prepared to help.

The uniform, the letter, the stern voice - it all has an impact and reinforces the seriousness of the situation.

In fact, that police visit is often the moment of change in a comprehensive inter-agency truancy programme called Rock On (Reduce Our Community Kids Offending Now).

Agencies share information on the student and their family, and all actions are planned and reviewed together. That means more information comes to light and appropriate responses are planned, be it mental health support, drug counselling for parents, assistance with transport or uniform costs and so on.

The causes of persistent truancy are complex. Motivation to start the programme was quite straightforward by comparison.

The initiative began in 2003 when Inspector Karen Henrikson, then a senior sergeant in Hamilton, publicly voiced concerns about the number of teenagers involved in burglaries.

"It came about due to the increase in youth crime during school hours and frustrations among my staff that they were dealing with these youths."

That prompted a meeting with other agencies. Participants soon discovered the same students were named in each agency's books but there was no coordinated response. Since these early days *Rock On* has become an outstanding success. Aranui High was invited to join the project in 2008.

Project Aims:

- Reduce truancy and youth offending.**
- Increase engagement in education.**

SERVICES ACADEMY TRIP TO CASS BAY

Services Academy – Reconnaissance to Cass Bay

Purpose: To introduce students of the Service Academy to life skills, ethos and values, and to foster teamwork in order to provide the foundation for continued training throughout the remainder of the year in an adventure based environment.

Daily/Night routine consisted of the following:

0630hrs- Prayers followed by Physical activity including running up and down hills, push-ups and scenic runs through Cass Bay community.

0800hrs students were given inspections on their particular task and their living quarters. Students were split into four groupings for morning and night routine:

Group 1 – Cooking

Group 2 – Kitchen duties

Group 3 – Dining room

Group 4 - Ablutions

Corrective training was administered generously to all students for all indiscretions

Daily activities consisted of the following: Introduction to tramping; Cooking with gas burners; Packing a pack; Making bed rolls; Kayaking; Cycling the Little River Rail Trail; Community service (mucking in at a house); The seniors were given leadership roles within the four groups.

Summary – This camp was designed for staff and students to get to know each other and to prepare students for their upcoming induction course at West Melton. Mentoring was given from the staff on this trip and I wish to acknowledge the contribution of the support staff Mr Steven Payne, Ms Nardine Schroder, Mr Derek Sangster, Ms Ella Macey and Mr Sam Hudson.

INTRODUCING COMMUNITY EDUCATION DIRECTOR - ROY TIKAO

We welcome Roy Tikao back to Aranui as the new Director of the Community Learning Centre.

Roys' CV includes an impressive range of achievements, including working at Work and Income and Canterbury Development Corporation as an Employment Advisor Roy (during which time Roy formed a local sports group, Nga Toa Whakapono) Roy's other employment history includes being Branch Manager - United Bank, Director - Ngai Tahu Finance, International Manager - Carich New Zealand, South Island Sales Manager McCracken Sports Goods & Sportswear (owned by David McCracken an ex-Aranui High School student) and Territory Manager - Proctor and Gamble.

Roy Tikao has recently been appointed "Director of Adult Education and Community Learning" at the Aranui Community Learning Centre, which is located in the Aranui High School Main Office area. Roy's attention is now focused passionately on Adult Education and Community Learning and he is very encouraged to see so many people attending the day and evening classes that are held at the school and also at various other locations such as churches, community organisations and educational institutions within the Pegasus / Eastern area.

Roy believes that this makes us quite unique in the fact that we strive to work quite closely within the community to develop programmes that address their educational and learning needs, which explains why our courses are so popular!

Next month will see Community Learning begin a advertising campaign for the new courses and we would like to invite and encourage as many people within the community to attend them.

Roy has replaced Matt Walters, who after five years in the role, has moved to a new position with the Aranui Community Trust (ACTIS) Matt's role as community development facilitator at the Aranui Community Trust is focused predominantly around two main areas. The first areas is to develop a results based model for the Aranui Community Trust and the Aranui Community.

NURSE - ALISON WIN

Allison has currently taken over the position of Anna Wilkinson who is on maternity leave. As you are aware the HPV immunisation programme is being implemented around New Zealand. Your daughter will be given an information pamphlet about this soon. The school will not be immunising, this will be done by your local medical centre.

Allison would like to hear from you if you have any concerns about your teenage children.

Cervical Cancer Vaccination for Girls

Most of you will have heard about the cervical cancer vaccine that is being offered to all girls aged 12 to 18 years. The vaccine can help protect them from the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) that is the main cause of cervical cancer.

In Canterbury this vaccine is being delivered FREE through General Practices rather than at school. Your daughters will receive an invitation from your usual doctor's surgery to come and have their vaccination, or you can ring and organise a time that suits. Three injections in the upper arm over six months are required to complete the course.
